4. Course content

1. Brief description of the course and its content including details of any subdivisions

The course consists of a historical introduction to the concept of religion based on a theory of science perspective. The course offers a review of the historical processes that have shaped the concept of religion and how this has affected today's understanding of religion, from the concept's original ancient context to Christianity's takeover of the term, via the Middle Ages to the growth of Protestantism and the advent of modernity. The course covers the Enlightenment, the Romantic era and the colonial period as well as the modern and, in particular, the postmodern era's effect on ideas concerning religion. A special focus is placed on the Swedish context and religion's relation to secular society.

The student will study in depth and adopt a position on central debates that shaped the scientific study of religion, debates that have addressed the analytical accuracy of the concept. The student will learn to apply different critical perspectives – postcolonial, gender studies, historical-critical and others – and receive a basic introduction to theorising in the different disciplines of religious studies.
